British Columbia is the first province to offer the T911 service. The service started in March 2014.

How do I get started?

You must register your cellphone to use the T911 service. Register your cellphone with your service provider.

You can text 911 for help

Are you deaf, hard-of-hearing or speech impaired? Now you can text for help.

The new service is called T911. You can text police, ambulance and fire emergency services for help.

How does it work?

Dial 9-1-1 on the cellphone you registered.

The emergency operator will answer with a text message. You can text information about your emergency to the operator.
